HISTORY OF TASMANIA

Dutch explorer Abel Tasman was the first European to set sight on the most southern part of Australia in 1642, landing at Blackman's Bay and proclaiming the landmass to be known as Van Diemens Land, after Anthony van Diemen, Governor General of the Dutch East Indies company at the time.

Van Diemens Land was first thought to be attached to Australia, it wasn't until Matthew Flinders circumnavigated the island in 1798 that it was found to be a island separate to the Australian mainland.

Lieutenant John Bowen from New South Wales was sent to the Derwent River in 1803, to establish a military outpost due to rising French activity in the pacific area at the time.

Unlike the main settlements in Australia, Van Diemens Land was slow to start brewing colonial ales. The first recorded brewery was James Austin who had a ferry north of Hobartown crossing the Derwent river.

James Austin was a convict, transported to Port Phillip in 1803 and then shipped to Van Diemens Land in 1804. After his sentence was expired, James was given a small land grant on the Western Shore of the Derwent between Hobartown and New Norfolk, and in 1818 hew built a ferry service, crossing the Derwent. Along with the ferry, James built a Inn and stabling for travelers, and to supply the Inn with ale, James built a small brewery.

James's ale was well received and would have been much cheaper to buy than the imported English ales. The brewery was short lived, closing in 1824, but by then many new breweries had been established in both Hobartown and Launceston, as well as several smaller country townships.

The first brewer in Hobartown was George Gatehouse at the New Town Brewery. George who was originally known as John Simpsons was sentenced to transportation in 1803 for theft in Middlesex, England. John arrived in New South Wales in 1804, where he carried out his sentence. By 1812 Johns sentence was finished and he could see the opportunities the new world could provide, so he returned to England when he raised some money to fund his new life in Australia.

When John returned to Australia in 1816 he changed his name to George Gatehouse and he received 400 acres of land near Hobartown. George quickly established a mercantile business and quickly started to amass some wealth, and with this new money George started to build a brewery in Argyle Street. The brewery was completed in 1820, and with most early colonial brewers he had some problems with quality of his ales.



Van Diemaens Land did not become an independent colony until 1825 when Major General Ralph Darling was appointed Governor of New South Wales and proclaimed it Australia's second colony. The state was primarily a British penal colony from 1800 to 1853 and was the main convict settlement for the Australian colonies.

In 1856 to colony of Van Diemens Land was renamed to Tasmania, in honour of Able Tasman the first European to step on the island. The main reason for the change of name was Van Diemens Land was known as a convict settlement, with a bad reputation of being nothing but criminals. The name Diemen also had a negative Demon association which the settlers did not like.

Most early brewers had problems sourcing raw ingredients for beer, the locally grown wheat and barley was of very poor quality and hops were yet to be grown in Van Diemens Land. So most brewers tried to import the ingredients from England, but some did try to use local produce, with other herbs being used as a bittering agent in beer. The Australian summer also hindered the brewers, with batches becoming undrinkable due to the heat. The local drinkers did not enjoy these strange tasting brews and colonial beer was given a bad reputation, and to avoided at all costs.

As time went by and the locals learned how to farm in Australia, and locally grown hops taking off in the Tasmanian climate, Tasmania slowly grew to be the premier brewers in Australia, with Tasmanian brewed beer being available Australia wide.

The most famous Tasmanian brewery 'The Cascade Brewery' was founded in 1832 by Peter Degraives. Peter arrived in Hobarton in 1824, he and Hugh McIntosh were granted 500 acres of land in the Cascades near Mount Wellington, where the pair established a sawmill. After some legal problems Peter established a brewery to take advantage of the plentiful water supply on his land, the new brewery was named the Cascade Brewery.

After a period of time Peter was earning £100,000 a year from his Sawmill, Brewery, Mill and Bakery. Peter died in 1842 at the age of 50, the brewery was passed on to his sons and would become one of the largest breweries in Australia.

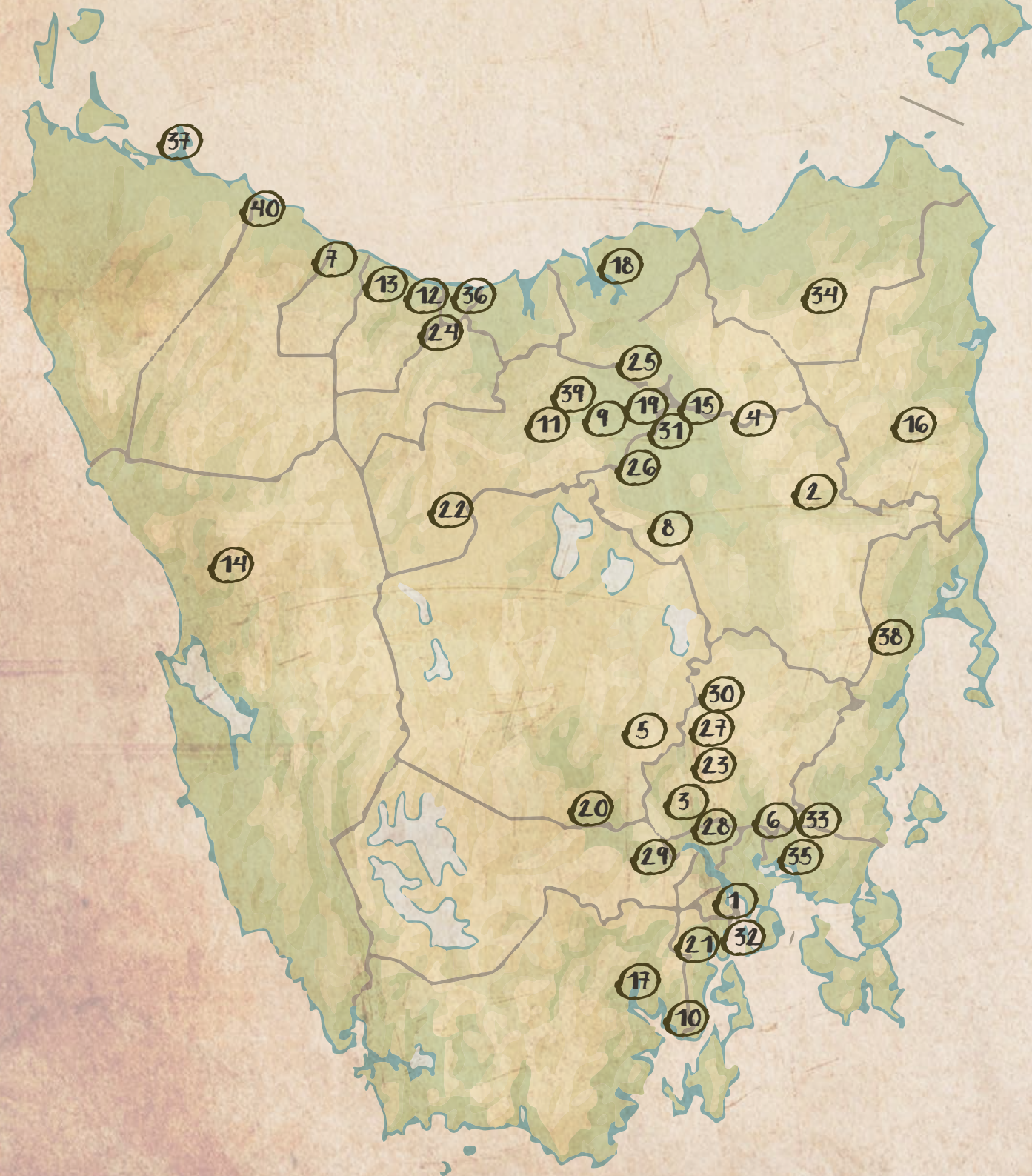

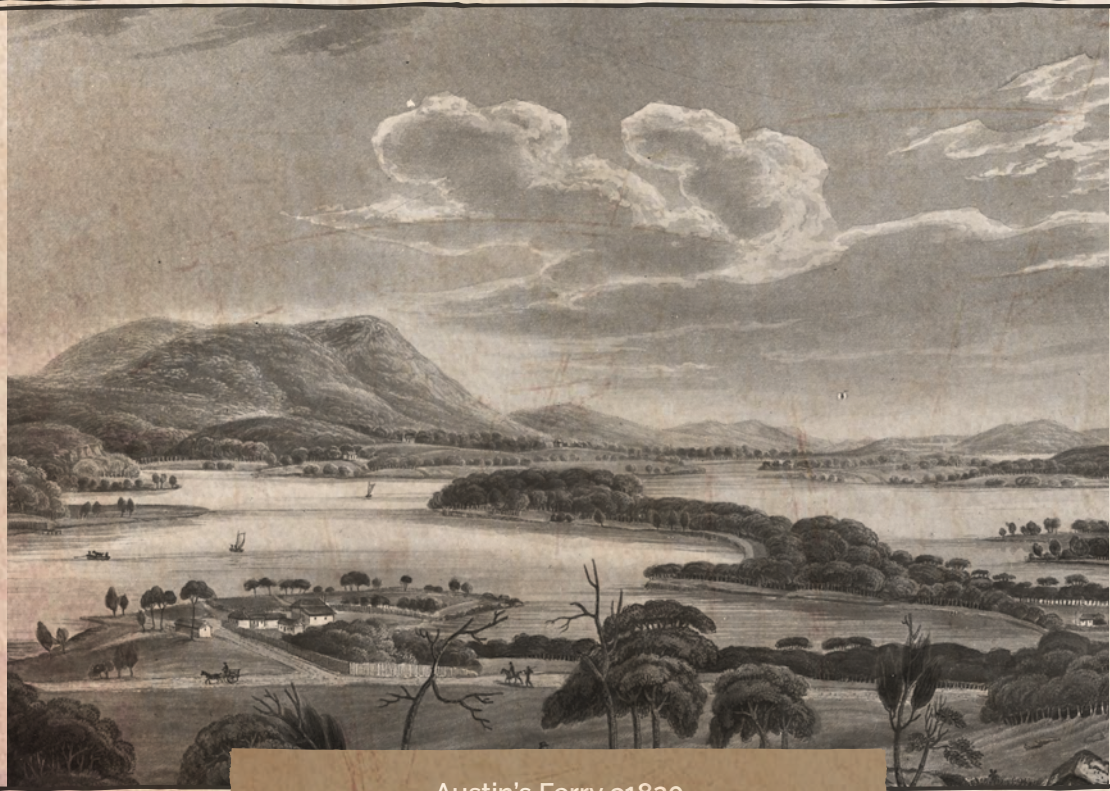

FIRE AT RETREAT FARM.--Our Deloraine correspondent writes :-The large wooden buildings comprising the homestead and brewery at the Retreat farm, close to Deloraine, formerly occupied by the late Mr. A. F. Rooke, were burnt to the ground on Sunday forenoon. The farm was purchased after Mr. Rooke's death by Mr. John Hall, of Bishopsbourne, and Mr. Geo. Hall resides on it. The fire broke out shortly before noon on Sunday, when all except four men and two or three females were absent at church or elsewhere, and had more assistance been promptly at hand, the fire could have been mastered in a few minutes after its discovery. As it was, the dwelling-house, brewery, and some out-buildings were destroyed, the only portion saved being the store and malt house, in which Mr. Hall has his grain stored, and a portion used by Messrs. Dimmock and Jamieson as a cordial manufactory; the portion used by them for a residence being destroyed, though nearly all their furniture was saved. It was from a chimney in the cordial factory that the fire originated. I believe the buildings and household furniture were partly insured. The brewery with its valuable plant, and the residence with some of Mr. Geo. Hall's furniture, were totally destroyed.

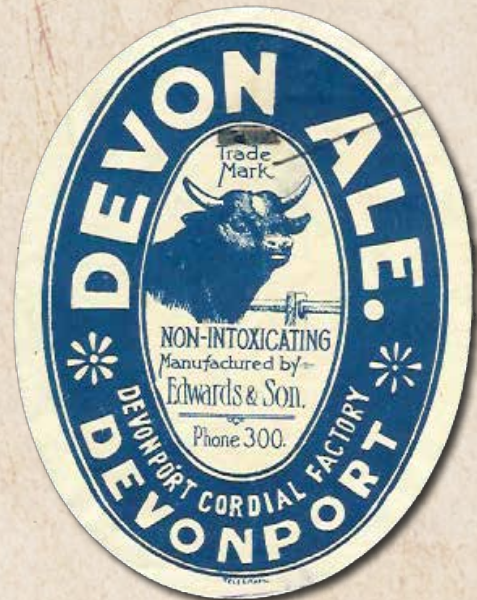

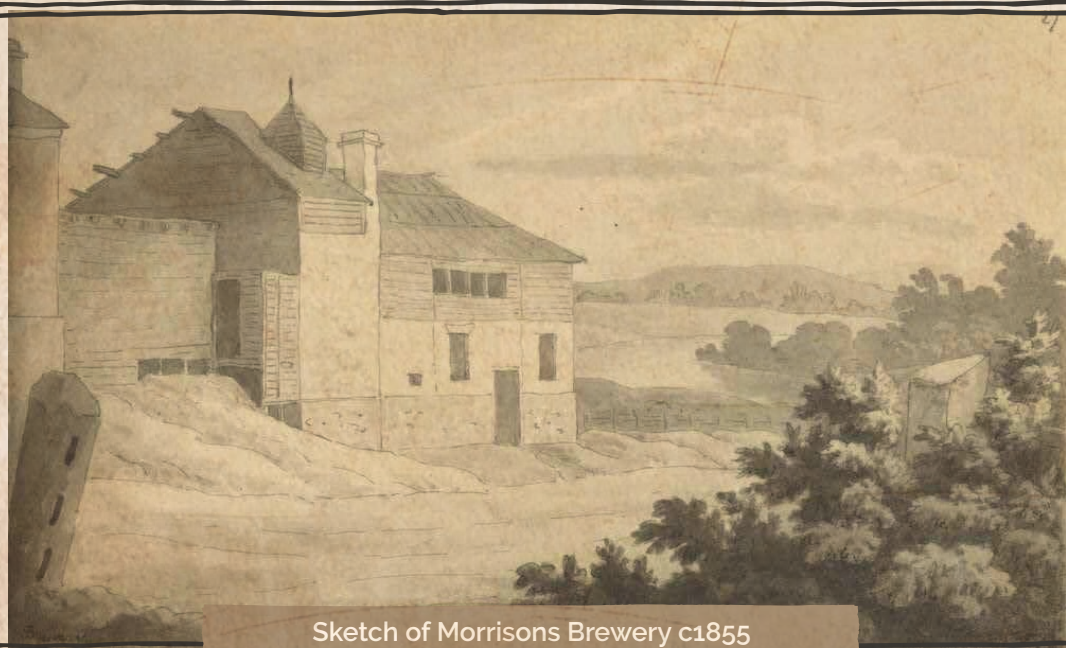

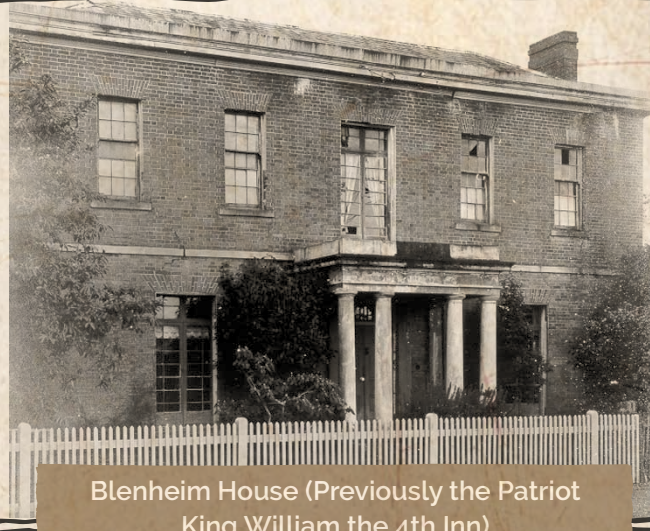

TASMANIAN INDUSTRIES.
[No. 17.]
ARTILLERY BREWERY.

The Artillery Brewery, in Gore street, on the bank of the Hobart Town Rivulet, was a few months ago purchased by Mr William Gracie, who is well known from his sixteen years' connection with the Cascade Brewery. The establishment was formerly carried on by Mr Pascoe, but for a considerable time past it had been unoccupied, and some of the buildings had been allowed to fall almost into ruin. When Mr Gracie took possession the old brewery building was pulled down, and a new one of stone and brick erected, and at the present time the brewery, malt houses, and other buildings form a square. The site is an excellent one for the purpose, the proximity to the rivulet, and the slope of the ground, being all favourable to good drainage, a most important matter in connection with an establishment of this kind. There are five floors to the new brewery building, and in our description of the premises, and the various appliances in use, we shall commence at the top. Upon this floor is a large square wooden tank called the hot liquor vat, in which the water to be used in the brewing is boiled by steam. The water is laid on to the vat from the main, and the steam for boiling is conveyed up in a pipe from the boiler below. The vat will hold about 1,500 gallons of water. On the same floor is a large hopper through which the crushed malt is sent into the mash tun below, the grain being first hoisted in bags from the ground floor through a set of hatches made in the different floors for that purpose. Going down to the room below we find a large circular wooden mash tun capable of holding about 1,000 gallons. In this tun the second process in brewing - the mashing of the crushed malt - is completed. The mash tun is provided with a false perforated wood bottom, which allows the liquor to escape and retains the refuse, commonly known as grains, in the tun. The

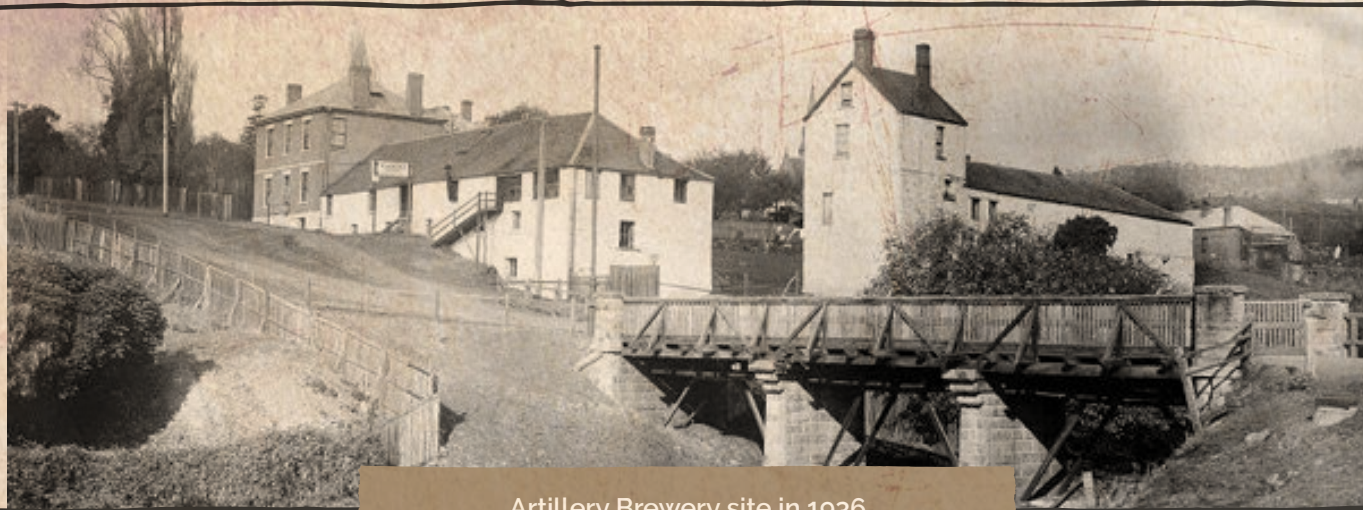
mashing or thorough mixing of the boiling water and malt, is done by one of Robison's patent mashing machines. This is in reality a large copper spout fixed to the bottom of the hopper, through which the malt passes to the tun. The water is also conveyed into the tun through the same spout, so that the mixing is complete. When the liquor has been allowed to run off into a copper which will boil 25 hogsheads, the top of which may be seen on this floor, the grains are shosellei out of the tun and tin own into a shoot which conveys them to the ground floor for removal. On this floor there is also a hopper commanding the malt crusher below. Going down to the next room we find the bottom of the copper solidly bricked in. When the liquor is in the copper, the hops and other ingredients requisite in the manufacture of ale and beer are put in, and when it has been allowed to boil for a sufficient length of time, by the turning of a tap the hot liquor can be allowed to run along a small wooden trough to the flat cooler, situated in another apartment on the same floor. From the flat cooler, which is a shallow wooden tray about 20ft square, the liquor by the turning of another tap is directed to one of Robison's patent refrigerators immediately below. The malt crusher to which allusion has been made is one of the kind generally in use, and consists merely of a pan of iron rollers between which the grain is crushed. Mr Clarke, of the New Wharf, was the maker. Stepping from the floor where the copper is situated to a wooden stage outside, access can be had to the furnace by which the copper is heated, and here also is a valve for regulating the supply of steam to the hot liquor vat on the upper story. This is a great convenience and saves a good deal of trouble to the brewer. The patent refrigerator consists of 24 copper pipes, each about 8ft. 6in. long, set in a frame one above the other. On the top there are copper pans into which the liquor runs from the flat cooler, and is then allowed to flow over the pipes, which have a continuous stream of cold water passing through them. When the liquor has been cooled by its passage over the refrigerator, it is conveyed by a trough to two fermenting tuns, one of which will hold 30 hogsheads, and the other 25 hogsheads. After fermentation the ale or beer is ready to go into the working casks in the cellar, and into these it is conveyed by means of a hose. The ventilation throughout the part of the brewery we have described has been carefully provided for by louver windows through which a current of air continually passes. This has been especially provided for in the neighbourhood of the flat cooler, round which there are half a dozen of these louver windows. The fermenting tuns are at one end of the cellar, which is a very fine one. It is 120ft. in length by 24ft. in width and is flagged with stone. The drainage is complete, and the water has been laid on in such a manner that perfect cleanliness can be ensured. The casks in which the ale and beer work are arranged all round the ctillo on stages, and Mr Gracie says that he has room enough to work fully 200 hogsheads per week. The casks to be sent out have to be raised from the cellar to the loading stage outside the brewery building by means of a

winch. A Scotch made vertical engine of 8 horse power is used at the brewery for crushing the malt and other purposes. It has a fly wheel 8ft. in diameter, and although it has only had two trials, up to the present time it works well and smoothly, and has been found to be fully up to the work required of it. The boiler by which the engine is driven, and which supplies the steam for the various purposes required, is horizontal one with Gallaway tubes. Near the engine is the wash-house, where the casks are cleansed. This place is flagged with stone, and is provided with a steam jet over which the casks that are to be cleaned are placed. The exhaust steam is all conveyed into a large sized wooden tank, from which hot water is obtained to wash the casks, and from which the boiler is also supplied with hot water. By this, a good deal of the expense for fuel is saved in the course of the year.

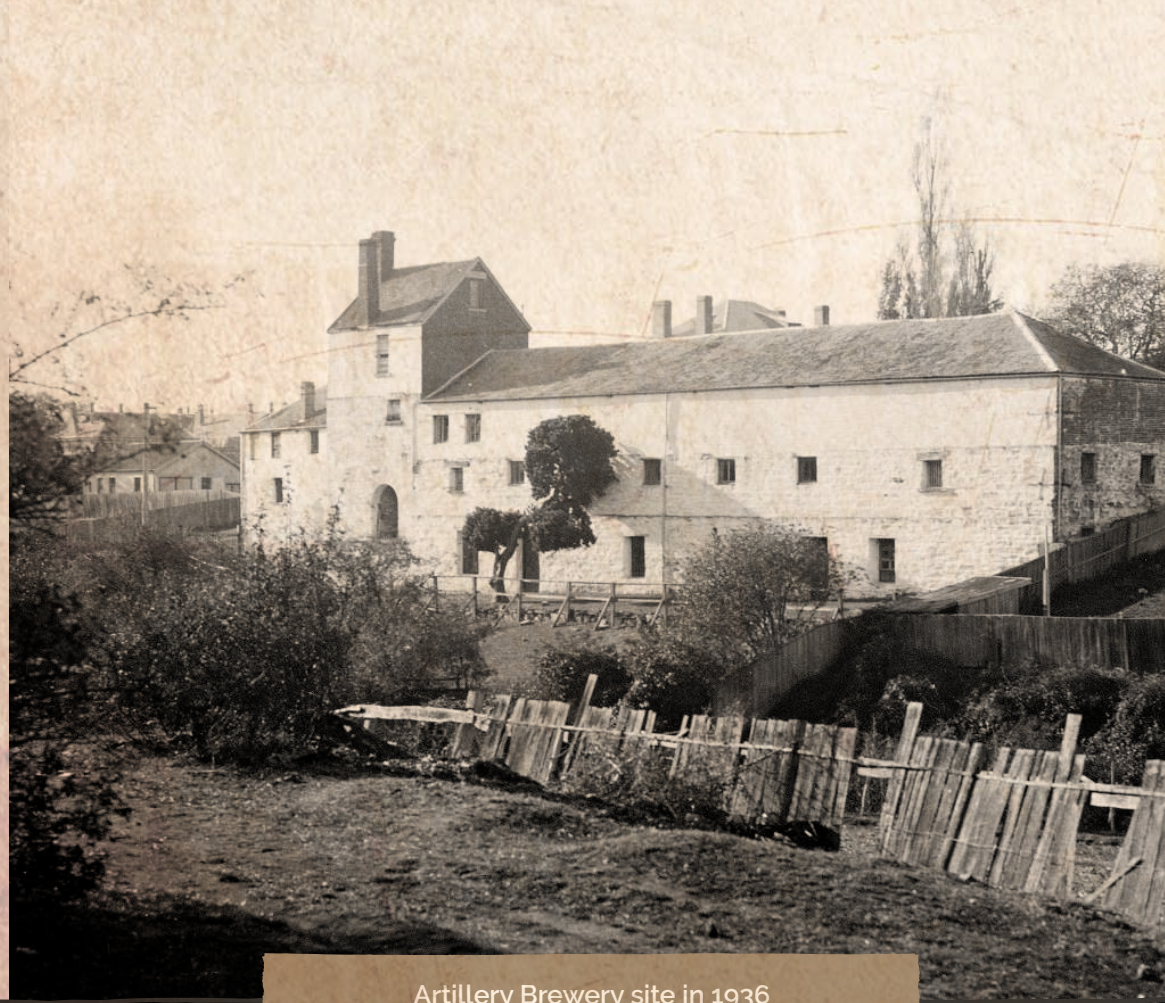
There are two malt-houses in connection with the Artillery Brewery. The first is over the cellar, and is of the same size, 120ft. long by 24ft. wide. The cistern in which the bailey is sttoped, is a wooden one lined with lead. The kiln at tached measures 20ft. square and has a wire floor. Over the malt floor is a granary of a similar size, in which large quantities of English and Tasmanian hops, barley, and malt, are stored. The other malt house, where all the malting is at present done, occupies one side of the square. The malting floor measures 90ft. by 20ft., and there is a stone cistern in which about 100 bushels of barley can be steeped at one time, while about 300 bushels per week can be worked on the floor. The kiln here is about 20ft. square, and has a floor of perforated tiles, now considered far preferable to the wire floors. Over the malt floor is another large granary in which there are two immense bins, one for barley and the other for malt. Both are well filled, and besides the grain stored in this way there is also a large quantity stored in bags. There is also a large pile of hops in bales and everything has the appearance of business. Mr Gracie informs us that he intends to give the preference to the Tasmanian grown hops and we hope his determination to patronise the native article will be attended with success. In addition to the buildings we have described, there are a number of stores and offices, in which may be seen sacks of corks and packages of isinglass used in the "clearing" of ale and beer and piles of casks of all sizes, showing that work will soon be commenced in earnest. Mr Gracie has not yet begun brewing and is just now engaged in getting the various vats and troughs into working order. The brewing will most likely be in full operation within the next two or three days.

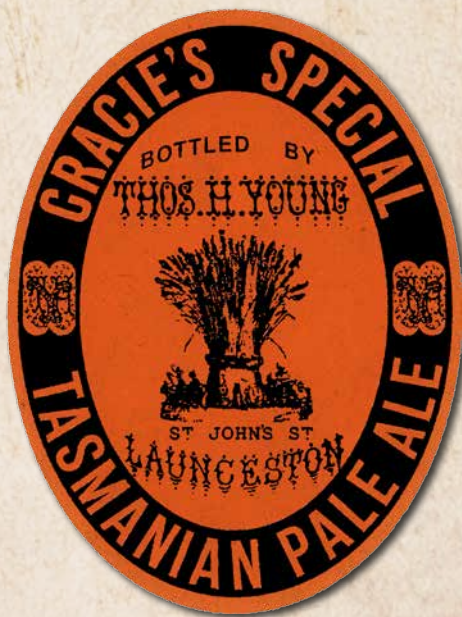
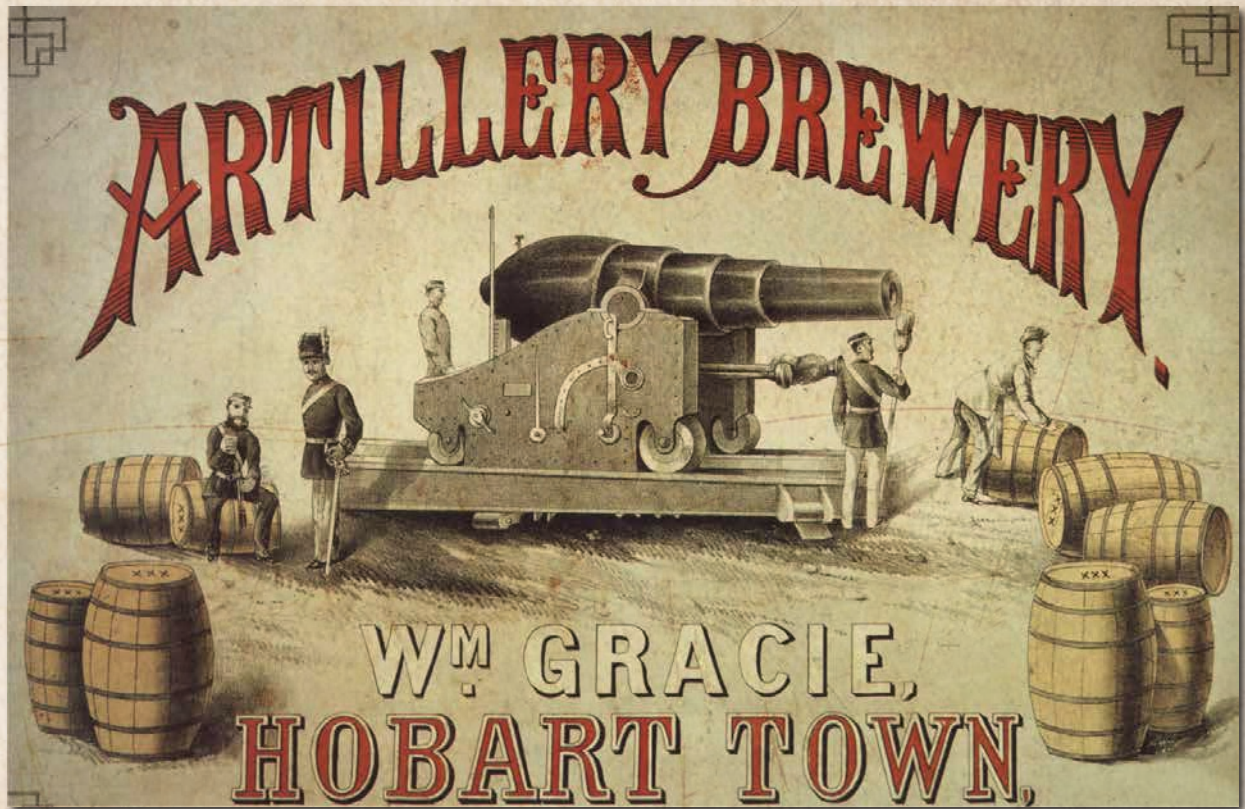


Artillery Brewery site in 1936

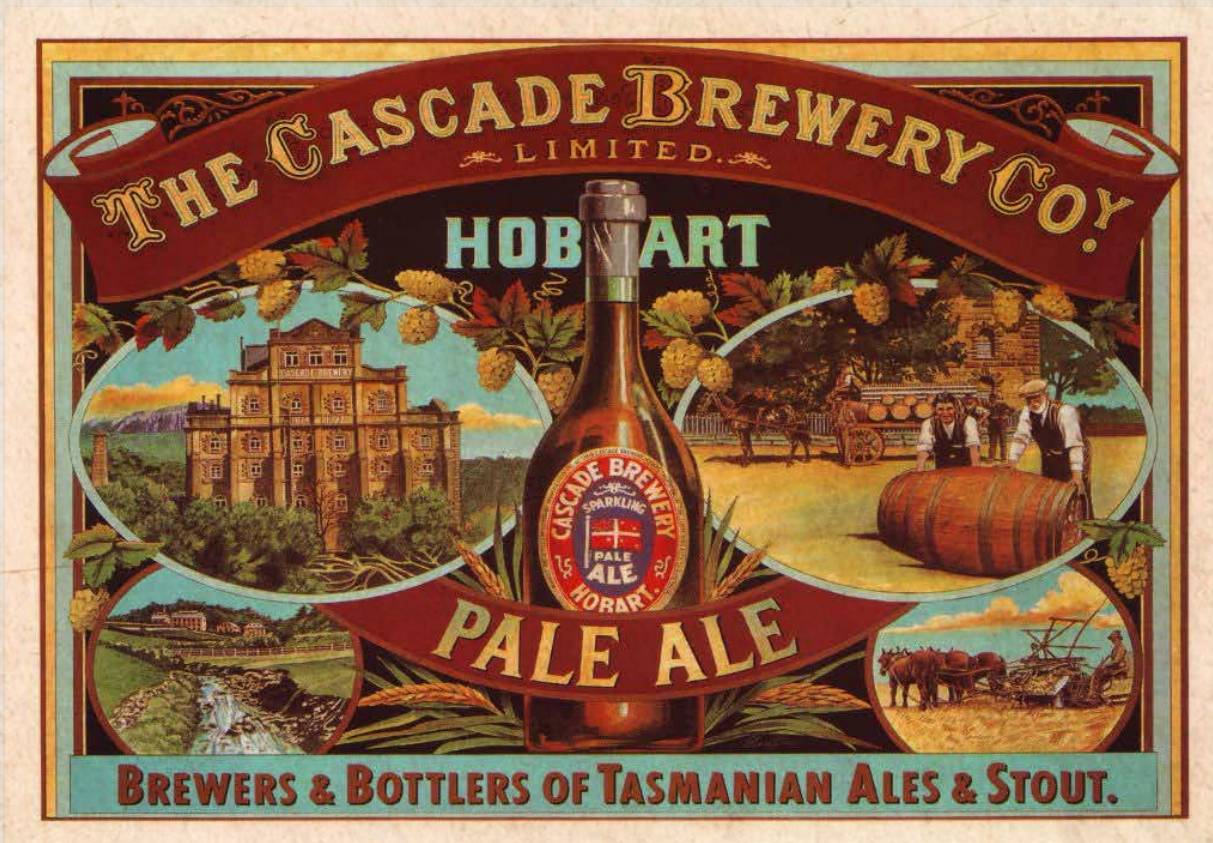

THE CASCADES BREWERY.

The machinery imported by the Messrs. Degraives for the purpose of producing ice at the Cascades Brewery is attracting general attention, and since the machinery has been set in motion, each day brings a number of visitors to witness the curious process. Although the ostensible motive for visiting the premises is to have a peep at the new machinery, which was yesterday formally set to work, visitors, before departing, express astonishment and admiration at the vastness and compactness of the establishment. The new pile of buildings has been erected of solid cut stone, by Mr. Duncan, a native of Dundee, Scotland, who also holds the position of overseer of the work in the brewery. The artistic skill and professional judgment displayed by Mr. Duncan in the execution of the work become doubly enhanced when it is understood that he is a stonemason by trade, and works daily on the premises in that capacity. Immediately surmounting the entrance gate are two casks cut from solid stone, but perfect in every respect, both as regards hoops and taps. On the cask-ends facing the road are clear and well-cut inscriptions, setting forth that the brewery was established by Mr. Peter Degraives in 1824, and that the present buildings were erected by Mr. Duncan. The whole of the new premises are not yet completed internally, but the massive masonry and extensive floors of concrete speak volumes for their durability and utility. In the unfinished portion of the premises is also erected a new copper recently imported from England, and which cost £1,200. When this is in working order it is anticipated that the proprietors will be able to turn out twice the quantity of malt liquors with which they at present supply their customers. By this means a very large business will be developed, as the intercolonial demand for "Cascades nectar" is daily increasing, particularly so in New South Wales, the demand from Sydney being almost in excess of the supply. On entering the brewery proper the visitor is at once lowered by means of a patent "lift" which works from the upper to the basement storeys - to regions below, where huge casks of ale and porter are quietly fermenting through the bung-hole. The flooring, as before mentioned, is concrete, and the drainage is complete in every respect. In this last-named respect, the Cascades brewery is far superior to any kindred establishment in Victoria, a fact of which the proprietors are fully conscious and appreciate according to its full value. The refrigerating apparatus, and hot and cold water pipes, malt kilns, &c. are all in apple-pie order, and are after the first models. The ice house is detached from the brewing premises, and stands on the left of the private residence of the Messrs. Degraives. The machinery has been manufactured by Siebe Brothers, of London the English firm who purchased

the patent from the inventor, Mr. James Harrison, formerly proprietor and editor of the Geelong Advertiser, Victoria. As has been stated on a previous occasion, great difficulties had been experienced by the proprietors in the erection of the machinery, but their efforts have been attended with success, partly through their own engineering skill, and partly by the assistance of Mr. G. A. Bond, engineer, who has had considerable experience in the manufacture of ice in India. At Cawnpore and Lucknow Mr. Bond erected no less than four machines in one year. The process used at the Cascades is that known as ether. The ether is contained in a large cylinder, which, under the operation of a powerful air pump, is transferred to a series of pipes where it becomes condensed by cold water. Having passed through a number of tubes, it returns in a liquid state; it then passes into a series of zinc moulds, about twenty-six inches square, and two or three inches thick. These moulds are filled with the purest filtered water, which, in about four hours time, is converted into blocks of ice. The motive power necessary for driving the entire powerful apparatus is obtained by the action of a turbine wheel, which has been on the premises for a considerable time past, but which Mr. Bond has utilised for the purpose specified. All doubts as to the success of the undertaking has now been dispelled, and the enterprising proprietors can congratulate themselves on having introduced and established another important industry in Tasmania. The ice will be extensively used on the premises for the purpose of cooling down the wort during the summer months; but the surplus stock will either be retailed to local customers or exported to neighbouring colonies. Of course, its importance as a medical restorative will be duly appreciated by the faculty in Hobart Town. We wish the undertaking every possible success.

JAMES'S BREWERY.

H. J. James's Tasmanian Pale Ale Brewery is at the upper end of Elizabeth-street. The brewery is one of the oldest in Hobart Town, but it has only been in the hands of the present proprietor and his family for the last 10 years. The premises and the grounds attached to them extend back from the road and up the hill for a considerable distance, and at the highest point, a good way from the brewery is a large iron tank which holds 250 gallons of water, for use in case of necessity. The brewery buildings commence about 100 foot back from the street, and slope gradually down to it, so, that there is no need for a structure of very great height. Entering at the back-door, we first observe a 1,200 gallon tank, with a vertical boiler for boiling, and for driving a 10 horse power engine. Below this is the mash-tub, in which 22 hogsheads can be mashed at a time. A sparge is used for adding any extra water to the mash. From this the liquor runs to the worts copper, which will hold 23 hogsheads, and here the boiling is done by either fire or steam. In the same part of the building is a powerful hop press made by A. J. Clark of Hobart Town, and a malt crusher by the same maker. Going down further we pass the furnace under the copper, and come to a room in which there is a very largo flat cooler. This is not used now, but it is kept filled with lime and water. This room is cool and airy, and in the centre is one of Robison's patent refrigerators, over which the liquor passes, after it leaves the hop-bock, on its way to the working gyles of which there are two, holding 22 hogsheads each. A temperature consisting of a pipe running round and round until it forms a circle, the size of the gyle, is used to keep the liquor at the proper temperature. This is done by the running of cold water through the pipes. After the liquor leaves the fermenting gyles it is conducted to the collar 'where it is run into the casks in the working collar, which will hold from 90 to 100 puncheons. The store collar is a fine cool place, 60ft. long by 20ft., and 7ft. in height. It was cut out of the solid rock. At the highest part of this collar, which is above the working collar, the water is laid

on, so that the thorough cleansing of the whole place is a very simple matter. The gas is laid on in the collars, and in fact all over the building, outside the brewery is the cask-cleaning shed, were all the casks are washed twice with lime and water and then steamed before they are used. There is no coopeage on the premises. The malt house is close to the brewery and at one end of it is a kiln, with a tile floor in which 150 bushels can be dried at one time. The malt floor is 100 feet long by 30 foot wide, and in the cistern 150 bushels of grain can be stooped at one time. There is a patent screen on the premises made by Robison and Co., of Melbourne, in which all the barley is cleaned before it coos into the stoop. The store room over the malt floor is 100 feet by 30, and a large quantity of grain is stored there at the present time. There are also stores for the hops and sugar. In connection with the brewery is a large kiln that was used in connection with the old malt house, but this is not required now. The brewery itself consists of a long range of brick and wooden buildings, but the new malt-house is a fine building of free stone. Mr. James informs us that he uses nothing but Tasmanian hops in his brewery, and that he finds it very good. The hops, he states, has improved year by year, and some of the samples he showed us were really excellent, while the light ale brewed with it was all that could be desired. All the barley used is Tasmanian, and at this brewery we hear the same complaint, that the farmers do not properly clean the grain before they send it to the maltsters. In the office, in front of the brewery, we were shown a fine bronze medal in a cedar frame, awarded to W. and J. James, as a prize for their porter and ale, at the Intercolonial Exhibition hold in Victoria. We have now done with the breweries of Hobart Town and even in describing them, we have written something to show that a good deal is being done in our midst in connection with one important and profitable industry. Anything in the shape of a manufactory in this colony is a help to its ultimate prosperity, and brewing is an industry that Tasmania is eminently fitted for. We have a climate that will enable our brewers to turn out an article unrivalled by anything that can be made in the other colonies, and when the almost prohibitory duties of some of the other colonies are removed, as we have every reason to hope they will soon be, there must always be a market for Tasmanian ale

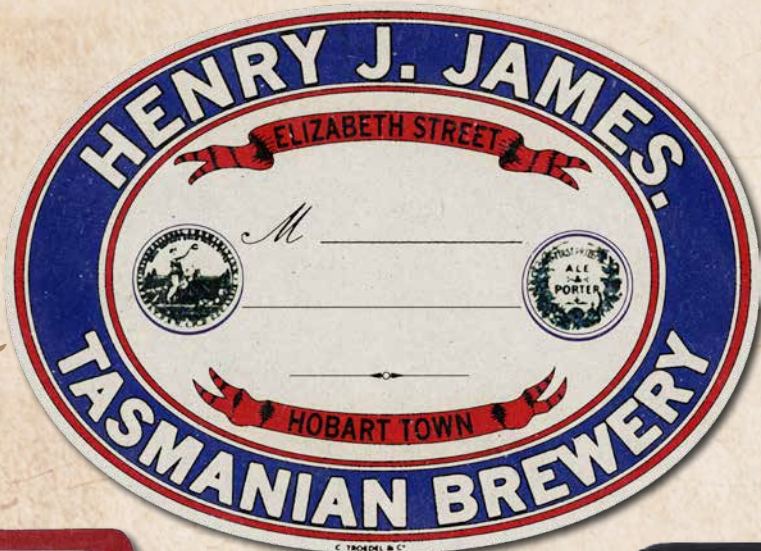

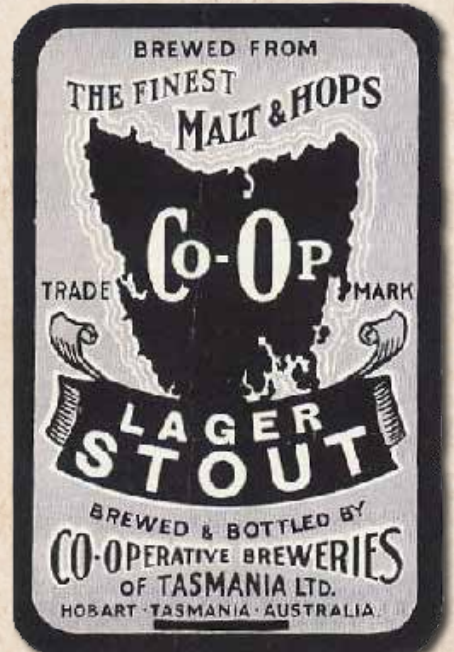

Walker's Brewery, in Collins-street, is now in active operation, and as Mr. Walker intends to use only malt and hops in manufacture, we sincerely wish him every success in his undertaking. Competition is the grand stimulus to trade of every description, and as Mr. Walker, as a capitalist, possesses large advantages, and has great opportunities of benefiting by the state of the market, he will be enabled to compete well with the large brewers, so that the public must eventually benefit. The brewing establishment has been arranged without any regard to expense, and the operations are assisted by the steam-engine, which constitutes the moving power of the mill.

WALKER'S BREWERY.

On Monday we visited Messrs. Walker and Son's brewery at the corner of Collins and Barrack-streets, and were shown over the premises by the obliging brewer and manager Mr. Priestly. It would be impossible to describe the shape of the buildings connected with the brewery, except by stating that they cover three sides of a large square, extending over an area of about 5 acres of ground, and having frontages to Collins, Barrack and Macquarie streets. An extensive malting business is carried on by Messrs. Walker and Son, and we were first taken to a large malt-house running parallel with Collins street. The floor here is 200 feet long, by 40 wide, and 1,100 bushels of malt are constantly working on it at one time. On the same floor there are two large tanks for steeping the grain, and in these 120 bushels are regularly steeped at a time. On the second floor the room is the same size as that below, and in the malting season this room sometimes contains about 25,000 bushels of grain. There is a kiln at each end of this room, one with a wire floor, and the other paved with perforated tiles. These kilns are 24 feet square, and will hold about 130 bushels of malt each. In the centre of this room is one of Ransomes and Sims's patent screens, and all the barley that is brought in is put through this machine and screened before it is malted. This is absolutely necessary from the fact that the farmers screen the grain very badly, and send it in to the maltsters in a very dirty state sometimes. On getting outside this malt-house we noticed the furnaces by which the drying kilns are heated, one by two furnaces, the other by a single one. On another part of the premises is another malt house, running parallel with Macquarie-street, in which there is one kiln 24 feet square, the same size as the other two. Here the barley is steeped above the malt floor instead of below, and as soon as it is sufficiently steeped, by the opening of a trap door worked by a screw, it can be let down to the malt floor. By this arrangement there is a good deal of labour saved. The malt is first of all placed in a large bin on the premises used as a flour mill. By means of elevators, consisting of a lot of tin cups attached to an endless leather band, it is raised to another floor, where it passes through a smutting machine. The malt does not look dirty before it goes into the smutter, but it looks very different when it comes out, and the quantity of dust and dirt left behind is astonishing. When the malt leaves the smutter, another set of elevators take it over the grinding rollers, where it is crushed, and then the elevators take it higher still, until it reaches the large hopper over the mash tub. Walker & Son have another large malt-house on the Hampden Road, with a floor 135 ft. by 30 ft., and a kiln built by Messrs. Tooth, and we are told that the malting floors connected with the whole establishment cover about 15,432 superficial feet. In 24 months they exported 13,000 bushels of malt made on the premises to Sydney. We will now come to the Brewery, which is a strongly built stone building, four stories high. What is called the storage cellar will contain, we

were informed, 4,000 hogsheads of ale. Then there is the working ale cellar, and another working cellar 35 feet high. Over the store cellar is the bottling department, in which the machines will bottle one hogshead of ale per hour with very little trouble. There are two coppers for boiling the liquor, one heated by steam and the other by Are, although if necessary steam can be applied to both. One of these will boil 50 hogsheads and the other 25. The hops when it comes from the copper is placed in an ordinary screw press. The liquor runs from the copper to the hop bock, and is then forced up by steam power on to a flat wooden cooler of small size, and a fan which makes 15,000 revolutions in a minute, sends a blast of cold air to blow the steam off the worts as it leaves the copper. The worts runs from the flat cooler and is then sent over the refrigerator, which is one of Robison's, of Melbourne, and measures 10 feet by 6 feet. It contains 29 tubes, which are fed by a 2-inch water pipe, the pipe which brings the worts from the cooler to the refrigerator, also being 2 inches in diameter. In the room in which the refrigerator stands, there is nothing else. The floor consists of battens a couple of inches apart, and the walls and roof are so constructed as to allow of a free passage of all through the room. By this arrangement the cooling process is aided a good deal. The hot water tank is 12 feet square, and 4 feet deep, and the water is heated by steam before it goes into the mash tub, which is 17ft. in diameter and 6ft. deep. The water passes through a washing machine at the same time as the malt, on its way to the tub, and is, therefore, thoroughly mixed before it gets there. This machine consists of an iron cylinder, 5ft. long, with a revolving shaft, armed with teeth in the centre. The worts after having passed over the refrigerator, runs into the fermenting gyles, and is then conveyed by means of a hose to the casks in the working cellars, where the froth oozes and runs out at the bung-holes until the ale or beer is fit for the store cellar and for sale. There is an extensive cooperage on the premises, and all the casks used are made on the spot of Tasmanian lightwood. The boiler in use now for supplying steam for boiling the beer, heating the water, and steaming the casks, has one fire-place 20 inches in width, and flues running nine times its own length. The boiler that was in use a short time ago, was a tubular boiler of seventy horse-power, with two fire places 2ft. 6in. in width. The expense connected with this boiler for fuel was 30s. a day, but with the now one the same work is done for 7s. a day. The setting of the boiler now used is on a new principle, and an immense advantage is gained by super-heating the steam. Near the boilers is a large fuel shed which will hold 200 tons of wood and 200 tons of coal. In passing over the premises we noticed the cask: washing apparatus. All the casks are placed over a steam jet, and

thoroughly cleaned in this way. The screw press, we mentioned before, as used to press the hops taken from the copper, was made in the machine room at the brewery, and most of the other work required is done there. The lathe upon which the screw was turned is a self-acting one ten feet long, and will turn a screw of the same length from twelve inches in circumference to any pitch. Besides this there is in the machine room a circular saw bench, and an iron drilling machine. All this, as well as the other machinery at the brewery, is worked by an overshot water wheel, 22 ft. in diameter, or an engine of 10horse-power, when required. This wheel is driven by water from a dam in the brewery yard, the dam being filled from the creek running through the premises. The wheel is an iron one, made upon the latest principle by J. Key and Co., of Kirkcaldy, "the langtoun" of Scotland, famous for its machinery, under Mr. Walker senr's. superintendence during his late visit. The timber store at the brewery is piled high with timber ready for use, and pipes that may be required at any moment, and near it are the carpenters' and blacksmiths' shops, in which nearly all the work in connection with the establishment is done. For fear of want of water, and to provide for any case of emergency, there are four reserve tanks in the yard, each holding 400 gallons of water. A brewery is a fire place for livestock of most kinds, and the pigs on the premises seem to thrive well, while Mr. Walker, sen. has fenced off and laid down with English grass a pretty little place in which his poultry can live a life of luxurious ease until the time comes for them to go the way of all poultry. There are comfortable and well-arranged tables for all the horses on the premises. Both English and Tasmanian hops are used at Messrs. Walker and Son's brewery, in about equal quantities. The manager tells us that there has been an improvement year by year in the quality of the hops grown in this Island, and during our visit we saw some good ale four months old solely brewed with the Tasmanian hops—a fact that speaks well for it. There are only about 10 men employed at the brewery, but were it not for the compactness of the premises, and the attention that has been paid to the arrangements, with a view to the saving of labour, a number of additional hands would have been required. We must not forget to mention that there is a fire plug in the establishment with hose attached, always ready for use. Mr. Walker, sen., has lived on the site of his present residence, which is connected with the brewery, for 50 years, and on the 10th of last month all his employees sat down to a supper given in celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of Mr. Walker's settlement there. The brewery has been in operation for about 36 years.

The following memorial addressed to the Mayor and Aldermen was, read :

I am much surprised to learn that, the Corporation intends making an extra water rate for Sydney Place. Will you kindly allow me to lay before you the facts of the case, for your guidance, before you make such an exorbitant water rate as you propose to do?

Messrs Merton and Co's object in coming to Launceston is to test by way of experiment the chemical properties of the water for brewing, on a new principle, ales equal to the best English bitter, ales sent to these colonies.

If these experiments are successful and the chemical properties of the water clearly demonstrated beyond the possibility, of a doubt to be thoroughly fit for brewing such ales, and if Messrs. Morten and Co. should make a brewery in Launceston I am certain they will be most happy to pay for all the water they use. Until such time, there will not be half as much water used at Sydney Place as at any private house in Launceston. This can be proved by the amount, of concentrated wort passed through the Customs, which is used instead of malt, and the size of the plant fixed for the experiments, which I should be most happy to show to any member of the Corporation, and the fact that there is no family living on the premises.

I therefore most respectfully submit that the Corporation, of Launceston reconsider the matter before they charge for water not used on the premise's.

A Brewery Trade Mark.-The Registrar of Trade Marks in Victoria has just decided a case which has an important bearing upon many trade marks.
